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OTAN Releases New Digital Learning Guidance

he impact of COVID-19 and the resulting reliance on digital learning in California provided both the opportunity and the momentum for a comprehensive review of the role digital technology plays in supporting adult learning. To that end, the California Department of Education, Adult Education Office, provided funding for OTAN to create the California Adult Education Digital Learning Guidance.

In January of 2022, OTAN initiated development of the *Guidance*. To assist with research and writing, OTAN contracted with the International Society for Technology in Education, CASAS, WestEd, and the American Institutes for Research for targeted writing assistance. To ensure broad-based input, OTAN convened a Digital Learning Advisory Committee with over 40 adult educators from the field to review and provide feedback.

The Guidance is meant to serve as a practical resource for the many individuals who support adult learners—classroom teachers, classified and support staff, counselors and transition specialists, school administrators. and consortium members in designing and implementing digital learning experiences with adult learners in mind.

The *Guidance* is based on foundational, research-based digital learning practices

and is divided into seven distinct chapters, a key word glossary, and supplemental materials. Topics discussed in each chapter are as follows:

Chapter 1: Overview, purpose, and history of digital learning in California

Chapter 2: Equity and access

Chapter 3: Adult learning theories and critical foundations for digital learning.

Chapters 4 and 5: Designing and adopting flexible learning experiences


Chapter 6: Digital assessments and data-driven instruction

Chapter 7: How to foster healthy, equitable, and inclusive digital communities.

Threaded throughout the *Guidance* are vignettes featuring California

adult educators providing practical real-world examples of meaningful learning using online environments. Vignettes highlight the work of adult educators across the state and feature a broad range of programs and settings.

Eventually, Diana graduated with an A.S. in Paralegal Studies, and an A.A. in Political Science. Despite all the difficulties of COVID, in 2020 Diana earned a B.A. in Political Science from San Francisco State University.

- At least 1 week scheduling notice.

For presentation (min. time dependent)

- In-person: 2 week notice before event and at least a 60 minute session.
- Virtual: At least 3 day notice before event and at least a 20 minute session.
- A projection system.

The Outreach and Technical Assistance Network (OTAN) provides electronic collaboration, information, and support for instructional technology and distance learning to adult education and literacy providers in California. Here is a list of some resources and the path to locate them on the OTAN website:

Teaching Tools and Resources

California Adult Education Digital Learning Guidance - The Guidance is designed to identify, document, and disseminate practical information for classroom teachers, classified and support staff, counselors and transition specialists, and school administrators to support effective implementation of digital learning within adult education.

Accessibility Resources - You will find OTAN-developed resources as well as resources you can use to learn more about accessibility and create your own accessible content and presentations.

Teaching with Technology – A robust searchable database to help adult education teachers and staff locate websites and other technology related to a specific lesson topic. You can filter your search by level, subject, and standards.

Web-based Class Activities - Web-based activities are monthly technology-based activities organized around instructional themes and topics as well as edtech tools, with ideas on how to get started and how to use in the classroom.

California Distance Learning Cooperative – The CDLC is a partnership between Instructure, the Sacramento County Office of Education, OTAN and CAEP TAP to provide access to distance, blended, and in-person learning through the Canvas Learning Management System (LMS).

California EL Civics Exchange - The California EL Civics Exchange is a repository for original EL Civics instructional materials created by California WIOA, Title II: AEFLA/EL Civics agencies which can be used to teach EL Civics content to English language learners.

Curriculum Offers - OTAN works to negotiate the best free or reduced-cost special offers for online curriculum licenses and professional development resources suggested by our OTAN Advisory Committee and adult educators in the field.

Lesson Plan Builder – Create, share, and publish lesson plans that address adult education content standards.

(Hy)lighting the Future

ith classes reopened after the COVID shutdown, a major consideration for educators is to what degree courses and services will be offered online. For many students, the choice between traditional, virtual, and hybrid allows more student options for flexibility and learning. For schools, this means offering a combination of in-person, online, and blended or hybrid classes. This newer opportunity to serve students with several learning choices promises an exciting venture into the future. Featured here are three examples of agencies embracing newer models.

Two agencies implementing HyFlex, or hybrid flexible instruction, are Garden Grove Adult Education and the San Diego College of Continuing Education. Both embrace the following similarities:

Removing barriers for students (e.g., transportation, securing childcare, and attendance costs) so people can attend to their education. This leads to increasing measurable agency gains and reaching their yearly goals.

- Expanding HyFlex classes in all areas which include older adults and adults with disabilities.
- Providing digital skills training in all cases

Rolling out blended and hybrid instruction also requires digital skills preparation for students to manage their coursework. Campbell Adult and Community Education designed CACE Connect, which is a four-day onboarding module that prepares and trains new students with beginning digital skills such as setting up and accessing Gmail accounts, sending emails, and logging into Zoom and exploring its features. This introduction eases some student anxiety toward returning to school and provides an equitable beginning for all who attend.

These three programs highlight ways our field supports students and their learning. We look forward to hearing more about how adult education agencies are supporting students by expanding course options that meet them where they are.

Every operating system and application will have a set of key combinations to complete tasks quickly. The same tasks are located behind menus which can be hard to find. Use a shortcut instead!

hat does it mean to be digitally resilient? For learners, that might mean completing a job application online, operating robotic equipment at work, making an online appointment with a doctor or texting with a health professional, monitoring a child's progress in school, or paying online bills. Digital literacy, especially since the part become a core literacy pagasit



literacy, especially since the pandemic, has become a core literacy necessity to the success of students in their personal and civic, educational, or work lives.

Over the past year, Jobs for the Future (JFF), World Education, and Safal Partners have launched the <u>Digital Resilience in the American</u> Workforce (DRAW) initiative and have conducted a landscape scan to identify the instructional resources and approaches that best assist educators to increase students' digital literacy and digital resilience. DRAW has adopted the term digital resilience, developed in 2020 by the Digital US coalition, to signify "Having the awareness, skills, agility, and confidence to be empowered users of new technologies and adapt to changing digital skill demands. Digital resilience improves capacity to problem solve and upskill, navigate digital transformations, and be active participants in society and the economy."

DRAW has taken the findings from the landscape scan and developed resources and professional development that can positively impact adult digital literacy. They will be releasing these resources throughout 2023 to state leads.
