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Adult Education helps their own: Fund raising helping learners/teachers affected by disasters

fter the devastations caused by the fires in California, hurricanes in Texas and

Puerto Rico. and earthquake in Mexico, adult educators and students actively raised funds to support those impacted by the recent tragedies.

The Houston Center for Literacy supports about 70 nonprofit adult literacy providers in the greater Houston area. These centers provide their communities with basic literacy skills, ESL, HSE preparation, and workforce training. The center assisted with recovery efforts by providing families with supplies, food, clean up, and financial assistance. Marian Thacher from CALPRO established a GoFundMe account that raised over

\$1800 from adult educators and students. "Each of these flood victims, along with many others, are connected to adult education as a student, teacher, or tutor. Each lost so much due to the devastating force of Hurricane Harvey."

Staff and students from San Mateo Adult School held two bake sales, with a portion of the

> proceeds going to Marian's Go-FundMe account. The first bake sale, benefitting the victims of Harvey and Irma, raised \$2201.66 which was donated to the Red Cross. Houston Humane Society, Catholic Charities Relief, and many others. Funds from the second

bake sale raised \$2400.87 for victims in Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Sonoma County, and were distributed to The Puerto Rico Hispanic Federation, Red Cross, and Sonoma County. Together, the school raised more than \$4600 to help natural disaster victims worldwide.



Adult Educators using Newsela Pro

ast July, OTAN purchased 200 licenses for Newsela Pro to support reading levels, including ESL.

This was at the recommendation of the OTAN

Advisory Committee to support reading in the adult education field. Newsela is an online service providing current event and news articles that can be scaled for different reading levels. This allows learners to read the same article. but at different reading levels. The system includes comprehension checks to assess prior knowledge before an article is read, as well as



understanding after the article is completed. Teachers can track student progress and adjust reading levels based on learner comprehension scores. Teachers began using Newsela in August 2017 and will con-

tinue through June 30, 2018. The figure shows some significant uses of Newsela; for example, almost 800 articles were annotated for learners by teachers,

but over 2600 articles were annotated by learners. There were 1400 learners enrolled in Newsela classes, and they took over 5900 quizzes on reading materials presented. Additionally, learners viewed over 8200 articles on their own. It is clear that learners are engaged in the materials and independently reading articles. As the pilot

continues, it will be interesting to see if these trends continue, and if increases in reading comprehension can be measured through CASAS testing. But that will be a future article!

Technology and Distance Learning Keynote Spotlight:

r. Barbara Nemko, Napa County Superintendent of Schools. was selected by the Center for Digital Education as one of the "Top 40 Innovators in Education." Dr. Nemko describes herself as passionate about ed tech, even though she bravely admits to sometimes struggling with her own technology devices. She is a strong



advocate of curriculum materials with embedded media that engages and motivates learners and content that can be instantly updated. Two "ed tech" programs of which Dr. Nemko is particularly proud are the "Footsteps2Brilliance" early learning for preschoolers (especially helpful for ESL learners and their parents) and "Tech Tutoring" where Court and Community School students teach residents of the Senior Center how to use their mobile devices.

Working in education her entire life, Dr. Nemko started as a teacher in New York City, then took a position at U.C. Davis evaluating California Department of Education programs. Later, when Dr. Nemko was Curriculum Director at Napa County Office of Education, she was appointed Interim Superintendent when the current Superintendent retired. Now in her fifth elected term, Dr. Nemko continues to use her ed tech enthusiasm to promote positive programs for over 21,000 students at five districts within Napa County. Her favorite role, however, may be the one she has with her two granddaughters, ages 7 and 9.

Dr. Nemko's keynote address, "Changing Lives: The Power of Adult Education," will focus on how Adult Education occupies a unique niche in California's educational system and provides an entry point for the acquisition of marketable skills. She will share how the lives of families have been transformed by this essential program.



New Year Time-saving Tech Tips

f you made a resolution to save time or to be more productive in 2018, these tech tips may help!





- To switch among multiple open tabs on your PC computer, press Ctrl + Tab. Use Cmd + Tab on a Mac computer.
- 3. To move backwards among open tabs, use **Ctrl** + **Shift + Tab**.
- Pressing Ctrl + Z will undo any change. For example, if you delete text, pressing this key combination will undo the cut. Pressing Ctrl + Y will redo the undo. Use Cmd + Z and Cmd + Y on Macs
- 5. Holding down the Ctrl key while pressing the Left or Right Arrow will move the cursor one word at a time instead of one letter or character at a time.
